The Landscape Architectural Accreditation Board (LAAB) at its July 13-14, 2018 meeting granted accreditation for a period of six (6) years to the course of study leading to the first professional MLA degree at State University of New York. This status is subject to review of annual reports and maintenance of good standing.

Accreditation is awarded on a time-certain basis. The six-year period of accreditation ends June 30, 2024. Accordingly, the MLA program is next scheduled for a review during the spring of 2024.

In making its decision, LAAB considered the program's self-evaluation report, the visiting team report, and the program's response to the report.

Enclosed is a list of recommendations affecting accreditation (to be responded to in annual reports). This list was developed by LAAB from the materials reviewed during the meeting.

SUMMARY OF RECOMMENDATIONS

Recommendations Affecting Accreditation

1. Marshall Hall needs to be renovated at a scale that is sufficient to eliminate all air quality problems, eliminate environmental (heating and cooling) issues, and eliminate all ADA and IBC (2018) compliance issues. This major renovation should include a high level of participation by faculty, staff, and students to assure the new layout and furnishings best accommodates the needs of the program in the 21st century, including teaching, research, and recruitment (Standard 7).
