Implementing Energy Justice Through Community Campaigns

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ABSTRACT

New York's Climate Act mandates 35% of total statewide spending on clean and energy efficiency programs for Disadvantaged Communities (DACs). In the past four years, over 16 million lbs of CO2e emissions were avoided through upgrades to homes and buildings through the HeatSmart CNY campaign. Fifty percent of the households were low-to-moderate income. How was this achieved, how does it align with DACs, and what are the lessons learned that can guide policy and practice moving forward? Which incentives were most effective, and what is available for future projects? Best practices, barriers to implementation, project timing and policy changes that can lead to the most equitable outcomes will be discussed.
